
Visit the **FREEMAN FARM HOUSE**. Look around the kitchen, buttery, and storage areas.

### **CUP CAKE**

Cup cake is about as good as pound cake, and is cheaper. One cup of butter, two cups of sugar, three cups of flour, and four eggs, well beat together, and baked in pans or cups. Bake twenty minutes, and no more.

### **CUP CAKE**

## **Ingredients:**

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 cups all purpose flour
- 4 eggs

Cream together butter and sugar.

Add eggs, 1 at a time Add flour and stir until combined Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Test to make sure it's done.
